Carr decision of the United States Supreme Court, I find the current efforts of the Michigan independent Citizens redistricting commission (MICRC) an especially valuable civic education activity. Please inform your students of this process as the MICrC moved to make finial decisions on the boundaries to be used in electing Michigan's 13 U.S. Congress members, 38 State Senators, and 110 State House of Representatives members. The attached report provides background on the creation and work of the MICrC, the public hearings held in October, and the upcoming schedule to determine districts for the 2022 election and beyond.
